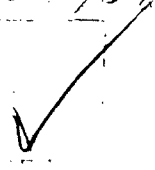

The defendants will be charged with crimes against humanity and the United States, resulting from radio broadcasts of propaganda and phonograph records.

Having sold their birthright for a mess of pottage they will further be accused of the primitive crime of treason

Radio broadcasts can be tuned out by a twist of wrist or can be eliminated by technical means. It is unfortunate that wars are not fought by phonograph records alone, instead of by the usual approved methods

"Once a Countryman always a Countryman" is a discredited though active policy of many countries according to which are a land of traitors.

Is it not unseemly for our great democratic government to drag these miserable ones from their justly deserved disgrace and ignominy to further punish them by the media means common to authoritarian governments? Have these methods ever deterred other dissenters be their cause right or wrong?

In the year 1948 A.D. we still argue the pros and cons of civil rights and atheists are permitted the freedom of the air these among other evils that beset us makes treason pretty "small pumpkins" indeed.
