The session will explore how the State and Tribal Courts reached an agreement on the management of the Court and the supervision of offenders and will discuss sanctions and incentives used.

Minority AIDS Initiative for Collaboration for Prevention and Treatment Improvement for American Indians and Alaska Natives at Risk for Substance Use and HIV/AIDS

In October 1998, the President declared HIV/AIDS to be a severe and on-going health crisis in racial and ethnic minority communities. In response, the Administration, the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), the Congressional Black Caucus, and the Congressional Hispanic Caucus announced a special package of initiatives aimed at reducing the impact of HIV/AIDS on racial and ethnic minorities. This workshop will discuss SAMHSA's \$3 million Minority AIDS Initiative (MAI) to assist tribes, tribal organizations, and urban Indian organization in 12 states that may be at risk for Substance Use and HIV/AIDS. It will also give SAMHSA the opportunity to exchange ideas and receive tribal input on how to best implement the MAI Initiative in tribal communities.
