Thank you for your recent letter. We here in the office were all glad to learn of your safe return home and to know that your trip proved to be an enjoyable one.

I have delayed writing to you principally because I desired to first obtain some information concerning the date of commencement of the trial. At the time of arraignment, the judge fixed the date as November 15, 1948. However, I have reason to believe that the court may grant the defense some additional time in which to prepare for the trial. I have called from day to day for the defense attorney to learn what move in this direction has so far, no motions have been filed and until the defense brings the matter of a continuance before the court, I shall not be in a position to give you any more definite information. You may be sure, however, that I will notify you promptly if and when any change in the trial date shall be made.

In the meantime, I trust that nothing will occur to interfere with your returning to testify at the trial since your evidence is of paramount importance in the case. The Assistant Attorney General recently addressed a letter to your employer in accordance with your suggestion, reciting the importance of your testimony and expressing the appreciation of this Government for the cooperation shown in granting you a leave of absence in order to testify. I am enclosing a copy of this letter for your own files.
