That's right, under the Act of Congress.

But you don't make any objection to the certificate from the Mississippi Department?

BY MR. WEIR:

Except on the grounds that we submit it is not relevant and that its admissibility has not been connected, not sufficient proof at this time.

BY THE COURT:

I don't think these New York certificates has to be certified like we use to have them under the Acts of Congress, under the new rules of procedure in the Federal Court, they need only to be certified like

you would on instruments in Mississippi, and I'll overrule your objection in its entirety and ad-2 mit these three birth certificates of Chaney, 3 Schwerner, and Goodman and let them be entered 4 and marked serially. 5 (Whereupon exhibits entered into evidence and 6 marked P-15, 16, & 17) 7 MINNIE LEE HERRING, called as a witness for and on 8 behalf of Plaintiff, was sworn and testified as 9 follows: 10 DIRECT EXAMINATION 11 BY MR. Well, Price came into the jail and up in the hall to our quarters at 10:30 and said, "Mr. Herring, Chaney wants to pay off, and he said, we'll let him pay off and we'll release them all." Well, my husband opened the door and he walked around the white boys were in the front cell and the colored boy was on the back, so he walked around the bars and asked the colored boy if he wanted to pay off, and Chaney asked him how much was it and he told him it would be twenty dollars. he didn't have the \$20.00 on him so he borrowed it from Schwerner and paid the fine, and so my husband wrote the receipt and Cecil went back and unlocked the combination and let them out and walked on out in the little hall. their belongings in a little box, and I had their driver's license, so each one of them reached in and got their billfolds, and put their driver's license in their billfolds, and my husband gave them the receipt and Price told them, "see how quick you all can get out of Neshoba County,"

1		and they thanked him and went on out.
2	Q.	If a person is arrested on a ticket and not a
3		warrant, do you have to keep one copy of the ticket
4	A.	Well I tell you now usually when they give tickets

21	A.	No, I suppose he gave it to him when he arrested
22		him.
23	Q.	You never saw the ticket?
24	A.	No, I didn't see the ticket.
25	Q.	Let me ask you one other question. If a person

is arrested and given a speeding ticket, can they make bond and pay you? 2 BY MR. BUCKLEY: 3 If the Court please, we object to that. There has 4 been no evidence to show that they were tendered 5 or refused a bond. 6 7 BY THE COURT: What's the relevancy of that. 8 9 BY MR. OWEN: Well, Your Honor, I would like to show the 10 ordinary practices as to how you get out of jail 11 in Neshoba County. 12 13 BY THE COURT: All right, I'll overrule your objection. 14 15 BY MR. OWEN: Mow, is it always necessary for the Sheriff or 16 the Deputy Sheriff to be around when a person 17 is released or makes bond. 18 No, they are not always around, if it is a 19 Α. little bond they have told us that we would know 20 just as well as they did what to do and for us 21 to go ahead and accept the bond and let them out. 22 They either make bond or pay off one. 23 And it doesn't require the Sheriff's or Deputy 24 Q.

21	Q.	Is that reflected in your book, what did you
22		write for being the reason they were released?
23	A.	Well, this is James Chamey, the 21st of June,
24	,	paid fine.

3	Q.	What entry did you make there?
4	A.	Released after investigation.
5	Q.	Now, did Price tell you he had made any investi-
6		gation?
7	A.	Well, they didn't make any at the jail but they
8		have before they brought them in.
9	Q.	But did he, how did you know to put that entry

11	A.	Well, he told us to book Chaney for speeding
12		and to book the other two for investigation.
13	Q.	Well, how did you know to put that in after

15	A.	Well, that's what he said.
