Mr. Bricker (by request) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce

A BILL

- To clarify the powers granted to the Federal Trade Commission by section 9 of the Federal Trade Commission Act to compel the production of documentary evidence.
- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 That the first paragraph of section 9 of the Federal Trade
- 4 Commission Act (15 U.S. C. 49) is amended to read as
- 5 follows:
- 6 "Sec. 9. For the purposes of this Act, and for the
- 7 purposes of any proceeding or investigation of the Com-
- 8 mission under section 11 of the Act entitled 'An Act to
- 9 supplement existing laws against unlawful restraints and
- 10 monopolies, and for other purposes', approved October 15,

- 1 1914 (15 U.S. C. 21), the Commission, or its duly au-
- 2 thorized agent or agents, shall at all reasonable times have
- 3 access to, for the purpose of examination, and the right to
- 4 copy any documentary evidence of any corporation; and
- 5 the Commission shall have power to require by subpena
- 6 the attendance and testimony of witnesses and the pro-
- 7 duction of all such documentary evidence relating to any
- 8 matter under investigation. Any member of the Commis-
- 9 sion may sign subpenas, and members and examiners of the
- 10 Commission may administer oaths and affirmations, examine
- 11 witnesses, and receive evidence."
